Club Structure and Organization: Leadership:

Establish a core team: President, Vice-President, Secretary Consider faculty advisors to provide guidance and support.

Membership:

Open to all international relations students, with potential for interdisciplinary participation.

Establish a clear membership process and communication channels (e.g., email list, social media group).

Meetings:

- Determine frequency (ONCE IN TWO WEEKS (ONCE A FORTNIGHT).

 Establish a regular meeting time and location.
- Create a structured meeting format (e.g., announcements, activities, discussions)



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Activities and Events:

	Skill-Building Workshops:
0	Diplomatic vocabulary and phraseology.
0	Effective negotiation and mediation techniques.
0	Public speaking and presentation skills.
0	Writing diplomatic correspondence (e.g., notes verbales, position papers).
0	Analyzing and summarizing international documents.
	Interactive Sessions:
0	Mock diplomatic simulations and role-playing exercises.
0	Debates on current international issues.
0	Case study analysis of historical and contemporary diplomatic events.
0	Guest speaker presentations by diplomats, academics, and experts.
0	Movie viewings of relevant historical or political movies, followed by a discussion.
•	Language Practice:
0	English-language news and current events discussions.
0	Reading and analyzing diplomatic texts.
0	Practice sessions for international conferences and simulations (e.g., Model UN).
0	"English only" sessions to force immersion.
	Cultural Events:
0	International film screenings and discussions.
0	Cultural exchange events with international students.
0	Visits to embassies or international organizations (if feasible).

Research and Publication:

Encourage students to conduct research on relevant topics.

Create opportunities for students to present their research.

Consider publishing a club journal or blog.

Resources and Materials:

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Textbooks and reference materials on diplomatic English.

Online resources for current international news and analysis.

Access to academic databases and journals.

Diplomatic documents and case studies.

Multimedia resources (e.g., videos, podcasts).

Evaluation and Feedback:

Regularly assess the effectiveness of club activities.

Solicit feedback from members to improve the club.

Track student progress in diplomatic English proficiency.

Conduct surveys or evaluations after events.



Example of a meeting structure:

- Opening (5 minutes): Welcome, announcements.
- Activity (30-45 minutes):
 Diplomatic vocabulary exercise,
 debate, mock negotiation, etc.
- Discussion (15-20 minutes): Open discussion on current events or related topics.
- Closing (5 minutes): Wrap-up, upcoming events.
